Public Notice: New Voter Registration and Changes and Corrections to Checklist

The Supervisors of the Checklist will be in session at the Nottingham Town Offices on the following dates:

Monday, May 23, 2011: 9 a.m. to noon; and Wednesday, June 1, 2011: 6:30 to 7:30 p.m.

The purpose of these sessions is to accept new voter registrations and make corrections or changes to the voter checklist in accordance with the New Hampshire 10-year checklist purge.

The Town Clerk will also accept new registrations and changes during regular posted hours.

New Landlord Law

A new state law requires landlords to give contact information to the Town Clerk. This information helps city officials get in touch with landlords or serve them with legal proceedings. The law requires anyone who owns property rented for residential purposes to file the information with the town where their property is located. They must provide the Town Clerk with a statement setting forth the property address, the property owner's name, address and telephone number and the name, address and telephone number of a town resident in the event the property owner lives out of state so the Clerk can compile a contact list.

All landlords must file within 30 days of becoming a property owner or within 30 days of the law taking effect, which was January 1, 2011. The town will not pursue landlords to file a statement and it is up to landlords to file the statement. Those who violate the law may be subject to a \$1,000 civil penalty from the state. Landlords may file their statement in person at the Town Clerk's office or by mail at PO Box 114, Nottingham, NH 03290. There is no fee to file the statement at this time. However, the Board of Selectmen may set a fee at their discretion at some later time.

Dog Licences

All dogs must be licensed by April 30 each year. The license fees are: \$7.50 for spayed/neutered dogs and puppies under 6 months of age; \$10 for all other dogs. Owners over 65 years of age are charged \$3 for the first dog. Late fees of \$1/month/dog are assessed after May 31 and Civil Forfeiture fees of \$25/per dog are assessed as of July 1. Licenses can be renewed by mail by sending your check and a self-addressed, stamped envelope to the Town Clerk. If you no longer have a dog that was previously registered, please contact the Town Clerk so the records can be updated.

Conservation Commission News

The Commission is reassured that voters wish to retain the contribution of the Land Use Change Tax (LUCT) for the Town's Conservation Fund at 100%, with no cap. Although there is presently quite a bit of money in the fund, most of it has been earmarked for conservation projects and easements in Nottingham. When completed, only a much smaller balance will remain, potentially not enough for any future large project that would require matching funds from the community. The LUCT does not come from the property tax, but is a penalty paid when land is taken out of Current Use (open space) and developed. Therefore, it is reasonable to use LUCT money to preserve open space to balance what has been "lost" and to mitigate the increase in all our property taxes that result from the impact of increased services due to development. The Conservation Fund belongs to Nottingham, it belongs to all of us, to use for those things we value more than money, the open spaces, our natural resources and the rural character of our town.

The Commission reviews Intent To Cut applications as well as wetland impact forms forwarded by DES. If you are planning a project that will impact a wetland, including a vernal pool, or intend to cut timber, please contact DES or a CC member prior to starting to find out if a permit is required. Wetlands are particularly vulnerable this time of year as amphibians lay eggs in vernal pools, insects hatch from ponds and marshes and become part of the food web that sustains other insects, fish, birds, reptiles and mammals. The complete text of The Shoreland Protection Act, RSA 483-B, is available online at <http://des.nh.gov/organization/divisions/water/wetlands/cspa/index.htm>.

The Commission is working with the Planning Board on a current Open Space Development application and will meet with the Board in the near future on this and other projects of land use importance. Recent collaboration between the two groups with input from the Selectmen, ZBA and the community has resulted in several positive outcomes, including the Open Space Development

alternative to the two-acre build-out plan. By working together through subcommittees and joint meetings, the town's municipal groups can generate a collective vision and direction at the beginning of any initiative.

The Conservation Commission meets on the second Monday of the month, and other meetings are held as needed. There are open positions for alternate members if you are interested. In addition to attending meetings, members participate in site walks, monitor conservation easements, investigate conservation related violations, assist in the development of new conservation easements, test river water every two weeks in the summer in the North and Little Rivers through the state Volunteer River Assessment Program (VRAP) and the regional Lamprey River Watershed Association (LRWA) groups, attend workshops and conferences, cosponsor educational presentations with the BML such as the Button Up program last fall, and participate in conservation groups such as Bear-Paw Regional Greenways and the LRWA.

Written permits are required for all outdoor burning. You can get a permit during all open hours when we are not out on a call. Please call us if you have any questions, or to leave a message if you will be burning.

All seasonal permits will be reinspected this year. Please call or drop by to make a request for your renewal to be completed. In the interim period, you can receive day-to-day permits. Staff will complete the reinspections and notify you to come in and pick up your 2011 renewed permit. Due to changes in regulations and for safety reasons, seasonal fire pits need to be reinspected on a regular basis. Please feel free to call if you should need any further information at 679-5666.



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The Nottingham School Building Committee

An Overview

The Nottingham School Building Committee was formed in March 2009 to address a number of current and potential deficiencies in the physical building that impact the educational process now and in the future. We have reviewed and analyzed a large amount of data ranging from a program analysis submitted by an independent firm to housing projection and census reports. We have hired Davis Goudreau Architects from Portsmouth to assist us with the planning and space requirements to reasonably resolve the current and future issues in the most cost-effective way possible. We are interested in a permanent long-term solution for the benefit of the entire town.

Current Plans and Schedule

Now that we have a qualified architectural firm on board, some of the steps that we will undertake in the next year will be to develop final plans for the renovation of the Nottingham School to incorporate all the program needs that we are currently deficient in and build for the future. This includes bringing to the team a construction manager to help assess the cost of any renovations. Plans will be developed beforehand based upon the school's program needs and assessment of the current and future space issues. We expect to be able to present the Town of Nottingham a comprehensive cost and plan for the future for a vote in March of 2012.

Input

In the past, we have had two public forums to try to inform the community of our progress and gather valuable input from the community. Unfortunately, attendance was not the best. We will be scheduling more of these forums and we will make attempts to inform the residents of Nottingham to the best of our ability. We will be posting a schedule for the planning meetings for the School Building Committee and encourage the participation of anyone in the community. The committee also solicited feedback from the community through a survey conducted in the fall of 2010. Rather than rely on

hearsay and rumors, come and understand what we are trying to accomplish and be part of the process. It is your town, it is your school, and will affect the future of the entire community.

Members

A number of committed citizens as well as representatives from the Nottingham School Board, Town Budget Committee, SAU, Town Building Committee and Selectmen's Office have worked diligently since this committee's inception to review the current school programs and make an assessment of facility needs to meet those programs and the future needs for the benefit of the students, teachers and the town as a whole. They include: Eric Danis (Chair of the School Building Committee), Nat Ewing, Autumn Ricker, (Parent and Community Rep.), John Decker or Barbara Scannell (Budget Committee Rep.), Tom Sweeney (Town Building Committee Rep.), Jack Caldon (School Committee Rep.), Michelle Carvalho (Principal), Kelly Davis (Davis Goudreau Architects), and Peter Bock (Selectmen's Rep.).

Goals

Our goal is long term and we hope to address and resolve the shortcomings of the current school and plan for the future. It needs to be done with the input and help from the entire community and it needs to be done in a fiscally responsible way. We all live in this town and have great pride in our people and community.

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Science Fair Success

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Planning Board News

The Planning Board welcomes new member John Morin, who has served on the Zoning Board of Adjustment and was elected by write-in votes in March for a three-year position. Incumbents Susan Mooney (three years) and Peter Gylfphe (one year) were re-elected. Election of officers was held at the first meeting after town meeting. The results were Chair, Arthur Stockus; Vice Chair, Rick Bacon; and Susan Mooney, Secretary.

The Board is grateful to voters for supporting the Planning Board's two warrant articles on the ballot. The Impact Fee ordinance is the enabling legislation that permits a planning board to hold public hearings in order to adopt an impact fee scale appropriate for the increase in services as a result of new construction (with some exceptions) in a town. The Amendment to the Nottingham Zoning Ordinance is Part I of a two-year "clean up". Most of the changes addressed the format with some for clarification and updated RSA references. Part II will address substantive changes to the content, which were identified by town's counsel this past year.

With the economy slowly in recovery, the Board has been asked to comment on several "Conceptuals" from property owners. There are also two development proposals in differing stages of completion. One is an Open Space Development that will preserve over 50% of the property as undisturbed hardwood upland forest while also providing wooded buffers to neighboring homes. This type of subdivision substantially reduces the roadway surface necessary in a conventional subdivision, costing the town much less in maintenance over the years, if it is accepted as a town road at town meeting.

The Master Plan Committee (MPC) will attend a Board meeting in late April to distribute copies of the Vision Statement and chapters that have been completed to the members and interested guests. The MPC meets once or twice a month with Mr. Jack Mettee, a planning consultant, who has assisted with tasks in Nottingham for the past few years.

The Planning Board meets every second and fourth Wednesdays of the month at 7 p.m. in the municipal office building. All meetings are open to the public. The regular meetings are broadcast on Cable Channel 22.

Before the malls and the big box stores, there was George W. Plumer, "Pedlar"

Members of the Lee Historical Society and the Lee Heritage Commission recently visited the Nottingham Historical Society to do research on George W. Plumer. A member of their group owns diaries started by George Plumer in the late 1850s, when he lived in Nottingham, prior to moving to Lee. George was a "pedlar", selling his goods in all the towns in the area and on into Maine and Massachusetts. He was also active in politics and attended local and state activities on a regular basis.

In March of 1858 George went to the Town Meeting where they voted to paint the Town House at a cost of \$15. At another Town Meeting, they elected officers and he wrote it was a "noisy meeting". Transcripts of some of his diaries were donated to the Nottingham Historical Society by the Lee group and are available at the museum for anyone to read who would like to escape back into the slower, uneventful days of yore!
