### Conservation Commission News

“Additional housing or conservation? Historic preservation or new development? Economic growth or quality of life? These do not have to be either-or choices. The Housing and Conservation Planning Program is a new voluntary grant program offered to municipalities through the Office of Energy and Planning (OEP). Grant funds will enable communities to purchase technical planning assistance to create a balanced local housing supply and to protect key natural and historic areas. The program will award grants through four planning stages, each stage leading up to the final implementation of a growth and development strategy.” <sup>(1)</sup>

The grant money will be used to pay for professional studies and requires an in-kind (volunteer hours) match of 5% from the community. This grant, if awarded, will be a town project that will ideally involve project leaders from the Budget Committee, Planning Board, Board of Selectmen, Historical Society, Conservation Commission and an at-large community member. On April 5, members of the CC attended *Saving Special Places* at Kearsarge Regional High School, an annual workshop conference sponsored by the Forest Society,

UNH Cooperative Extension, OEP and Conservation Land Stewardship. Of particular interest were sessions that dealt with conservation design subdivisions, affordable housing and energy use. Presenters included Professional Town Planners, people from DES, OEP, NH Fish and Game, UNH, AMC, Forest Society, law offices and nonprofits such as NH Community Loan Trust. There was a wealth of information provided and we all agreed that the conference was very worthwhile.

Do you like frogs, toads and salamanders? It’s that time of year to protect and treasure those special habitats called vernal pools. These are small depressions that amphibians use to lay their eggs in because they dry up in summertime and therefore do not support fish that would normally eat amphibian eggs. You might have a vernal pool in your back or even front yard. Please do not compromise these habitats with lawn chemicals and spring cleanup debris.

The CC meets every second Monday of the month at 7 p.m. at the Town Office building. The Natural Resource Committee is a working arm of the CC and meets every third Tuesday at 6:30 p.m. if there is work to be done. All meetings are open to the public and your participation is welcome.

## April 2008 Fire Rescue News

You may have seen in recent news reports an increase in the number of fire deaths in New Hampshire. These recent tragedies highlight the importance of residents adopting basic fire safety and prevention measures in their homes at all times. These include making sure smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors are working properly, ensuring home heating units are properly installed and maintained, and developing and practicing an emergency exit plan.

Fire safety is something you need to practice every day year-round. Be sure that children know what alarming smoke or carbon monoxide detectors sound like, and are taught to immediately exit any building when they hear an activation. Be sure that everyone in your home knows how to dial 911 and the importance of quick action in an emergency. Test your smoke detectors monthly and change the batteries at least twice a year when you change the clocks.

As spring is upon us, a written permit is now required for all outdoor burning. If you want to maintain your seasonal burn permit, contact the fire station Monday through Saturday between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. and speak with John or Dan. We are available during those hours, and on Sundays from 4 to 5 p.m. to issue daily permit requests, weather permitting. Be careful with all outside fires as the spring sun dries the grounds and fires can spread quickly. Outdoor fires must not be left unattended and need to have a water source capable of reaching the fire. No fire can be located closer than 50 feet to any building. A full set of rules and regulations is available at the fire station during business hours.

The Department will sponsor a blood drive on May 5 from 2 to 7 p.m. at the Nottingham Community Center. Please help by giving the gift of life, and donate blood!

Thank you to our residents for support shown at the 2008 Town Meeting. The new ambulance has been ordered and we look forward to taking delivery in early summer.

## Of Ladders and Leathern Buckets

*Submitted by the Nottingham Historical Society*

From our 1868 Town Officer book with Directions, Forms, Decisions and Statues, Chapter LXIV, Firewards and Firemen:

18. Buckets and Ladders. Every town may by vote or by-law provide that every house or building with fireplaces and stoves ... shall have thereon a good, secure ladder, reaching from the ground to the ridgepole, and shall be provided with one leathern bucket, of such form as the firewards may prescribe, for every two fireplaces or stoves in such house, under penalty of six dollars for every three months neglect.
