## **Nottingham School Takes Action: The New Bullying Law**

In July 2010, New Hampshire passed the Pupil Safety and Violence Prevention Act that addresses the public school's role in preventing and addressing bullying. New Hampshire was recently rated an "A++" state from [www.bullypolice.org](http://www.bullypolice.org) as a result of the new act, and the Nottingham School has already been hard at work to ensure compliance with policy and prevention efforts.

An anti-bullying sub-committee has been formed at the Nottingham School that will proactively review and revise bullying policy and professional development opportunities for staff. Our staff will participate in professional development opportunities that will not only define the new anti-bullying law, but train our faculty members about the impact of bullying and ways in which to prevent it. The anti-bullying sub-committee is a cross-functional team that is comprised of parent involvement, administration, and our Guidance department.

Since 2007, the Nottingham School has implemented a Guidance Curriculum that educates students about bullying. Bullying and conflict resolution have been a focus of our school's Guidance Curriculum, and reinforce our school's behavioral expectations of honesty, safety, respect, and cooperation. The focus of our Guidance curriculum in grades K-3 is to provide students with tools to handle conflict appropriately, identifying key adult figures that can help them when needed, and fostering positive interactions and friendships within the school setting. Older students engage in an anti-bullying program during their weekly classroom guidance, which is centered on skills that help children learn to work out conflicts in a peaceful way. Our Guidance Curriculum will continue to be a proactive approach to teaching students the importance of respectful interactions, as well as tools to handle bullying.

The Nottingham School recognizes that community and communication are two vital aspects to preventing bullying. The Guidance Department will have

information tables available at our Open House nights where parents will have access to information that is helpful in initiating discussions at home about bullying. A "Community Night" at the school is also being organized in which students, parents, and community members will be invited to participate in discussions about ways to handle bullies, empower bystanders, and help victims.

Nottingham School is committed to creating a safe and respectful learning community for their students. New Hampshire has taken a wonderful step forward in adopting the new Pupil Safety and Violence Prevention Act, and the Nottingham School looks forward to participating in the efforts to make our schools a safe and nurturing place for children.

## Home Energy Efficiency 101: Practical Improvements for Homeowners - Free Button Up NH Workshop Coming to Nottingham

Want to reduce home energy use, but not sure where to start? Tired of cold or drafty spots around your house? Wondering what resources are available to help make efficiency improvements?

You'll learn about all this and more by attending a free Button Up NH workshop on Wednesday, November 17, at 6:30 p.m. at the Blaisdell Memorial Library. The library and the Nottingham Conservation Commission are co-hosting this session, one of the 40 being held statewide.

The workshop will focus on the greatest opportunities for saving energy in homes and where to find technical and financial resources to get started. Button Up NH's specially trained presenter/auditor will lead a myth busting slideshow, display samples of energy saving materials, and provide free educational resources including a video of do-it-yourself projects.

"Button Up workshops are designed to help people learn about the best ways to save energy in their homes," explains Rhoda Capron. "These free workshops are considered a first step for NH residents wanting to learn how to be most effective in reducing heating costs."

Button Up NH is made possible by Clean Air-Cool Planet and the New England Carbon Challenge, in partnership with the Sustainable Energy Resource Group (SERG), the Plymouth Area Renewable Energy Initiative (PAREI), and the NH Community Action Agencies and with funding from the Greenhouse Gas Emissions Reduction Fund of the NH Public Utilities Commission, NH Charitable Foundation, Jane's Trust and NH Housing Finance Authority. ### Planning Board News

Committees, study teams, and the Board as a whole continue to work to update the Town's Master Plan, complete an Impact Fee Study, revise the Subdivision Ordinance to encompass Conservation Subdivision with a Workforce Housing option adopted last March, and tackling an extensive reorganization of the Nottingham Zoning Ordinance. The Board is also reviewing two development proposals and anticipates at least two new housing development projects in the near future.

For the reorganization of the Zoning Ordinance, the Board has engaged the professional assistance of Jack Mettee, of Mettee Planning Consultants, to facilitate this process. Mr. Mettee has recommended that the entire Zoning Ordinance be redone to include format changes, verbiage and RSA references, in order to produce a document that will be ready for the voters in March, 2011.

The primary purpose of the current work is to reorganize the Nottingham Zoning Ordinance into a format that will be more workable for all...this is what voters will be presented with in March 2011. Substantive, specific changes in the regulations themselves, will not be included in the March 2011 Warrant.

Some Board members will be attending the Local Government Center 2010 Municipal Law Lecture Series held. For a small fee, municipal board and commission members have the opportunity to learn about laws and decisions that relate to land use topics such as "Conflict of Interest, Disqualification and the Local Land Use Board Decision-Making Process" and "Cell Towers: Managing the Approval Process to Protect Municipal Interests and Comply with Federal Law."

Regularly scheduled Planning Board meetings are open to the public and televised on the local access channel and are usually held on the second and fourth Wednesdays of each month, with workshops scheduled on alternate weeks, as posted.

### Conservation Commission News

The Commission recently met with the Board of Selectmen to apprise them of three properties that are being permanently protected under a USDA NRCS federal program called the Wetlands Reserve Program. At least one, if not all three, of the properties will be offered for fee ownership to the Town for very small purchase prices. Money to buy a property would come from the Conservation Fund, a resource supported by the Land Use Change Tax paid by developers who take their property out of Current Use to subdivide. Property tax money would **not** be used.

Members of the Commission recently completed a monitoring of the properties in the Highlands Housing Development. Residents received letters of notification prior to the monitoring in which they were invited to participate. All residents with deed restrictions will receive letters re: the monitoring findings for their property and the properties in general.

The Digitized Tax Map Committee met again in October, and hopes to have a recommendation in the near future.

The Conservation Commission meets every second Monday of the month, unless posted due to a holiday or additional projects. The public is welcome to attend.
