The planned date for closure and replacement of the Deerfield Road bridge is July 10. Notice will be posted and letters will be sent to all property owners on the Deerfield side of the bridge as soon as the date is confirmed. The closure will be for a minimum of two weeks. The Town is making arrangements with Deerfield to provide emergency services during the closure. The Freeman Hall Road bridge was put out to bid on June 7 for construction in late summer. This bridge is already closed which means increased traffic on roads being used for the detour. Please use extra care on all detour routes and allow extra time to reach your destination.

Mulligan Forest awarded \$295,000 LCHIP grant

The Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP) awarded a \$295,000 grant to the Mulligan Forest project on May 8. The Town of Nottingham is working with the Forest Society to purchase a conservation easement over the entire 2,036-acre Mulligan Forest property that would permanently protect the land from development. Mulligan Forest is off Route 152 behind Fernald Lumber.

The grant augments the \$850,000 town bond approved by Nottingham voters in March. The Town's strong vote of support for the project was a big reason the project received LCHIP funding. The Board of Selectmen also submitted a formal letter of support and numerous Nottingham residents sent personal notes to LCHIP.

With town and LCHIP funding in place, the Forest Society enters the final phase of its fundraising for the Mulligan Forest project: raising approximately \$300,000 in private donations. The Forest Society's goal is to raise the remaining private funding by the end of 2006 and complete the easement purchase in early 2007.

The School Board is delighted to recognize and congratulate **Elizabeth Fletcher** and **Kathryn Wuerker**. Elizabeth, daughter of Roland and Susan Fletcher, is one of the top 10 seniors, Dover High School class of 2006. She will attend the University of New Hampshire, majoring in pre-veterinary medicine. Kathryn, daughter of Paul and Judith Wuerker, is the salutatorian at St. Thomas Aquinas in Dover. She will attend St. Michael's College in Colchester, Vermont, to study biology with a concentration in zoology and wildlife services. We wish them all the best as they continue their education.

On Wednesday, June 21, Nottingham School will host the eighth grade graduation. The board extends our congratulations to the graduates and wishes them all the best as they transition onto high school and continue their educational journey.

On June 10, SAU #44 was recognized as a "Follow the Child" School District at the New Hampshire Department of Education Excellence in Education ("ED"ies) Awards. This recognition is presented to those school districts that offer a "personalized education that helps New Hampshire students learn today, graduate tomorrow, and prepare for the future by supporting their personal, social, physical and academic growth." Collaboration among the three districts (Nottingham, Northwood, Strafford) has resulted in the following initiatives:

- Standardized Curriculum
- Special Education
- Transition Program for At-Risk Students
- Life Transitions Program
- Technology
- Health & Safety
- Professional Development
- Community Involvement

The Commissioner of Education recently released the 2006 Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) reports for New Hampshire elementary and middle schools. AYP is a component of No Child Left Behind (NCLB) and is based on the results of the New England Common Assessment Program (NECAP) testing in grades 3 – 8, which was completed in October 2005. To make AYP, a school must meet performance targets identified for reading and mathematics as well as other state targets related to student attendance and graduation rate. Academic performance of the school is measured as a whole as well as the performance of student subgroups, which are broken down by ethnicity, socioeconomic status, educational disability, and non or limited English

proficiency. While the school as a whole did meet AYP requirements in both reading and math, the subgroup "educational disability" did not in either subject area; therefore Nottingham did not make AYP for the 2005 – 2006 school year. It should be noted that Nottingham School did make Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) in previous years. A school is not considered a School in Need of Improvement (SINI) until it does not meet AYP in a subject area for two consecutive years.

While the AYP reports will certainly provide additional data for analysis, the administrators and faculty have already begun the process of data analysis as part of curriculum review and program planning. The analysis of data from a broad array of assessment tools (AYP, NECAP, NWEA) will allow the educational team to better meet the needs of all Nottingham students.

The school board hosted a Community Forum on Thursday, June 1 to hear concerns and ideas regarding the teachers' contract. We would like to thank those in attendance who openly shared their concerns and ideas. The facilitator, Susan Auberbach of Engaging Results, will be compiling the data from the forum and presenting recommendations based on that data at an upcoming board meeting.

During the summer months the school board will be focusing on continued policy development and reviewing the current school district goals. Goal review will entail evaluation of progress on the current goals, determining the need for new goals, prioritizing existing goals, and eliminating those goals that we've met.

The Board welcomes your attendance and participation at all meetings. Time is set aside at both the beginning and end of each meeting for public comment. The board meets 7 p.m. on the first and third Wednesday of each month at the school library. Meetings are cablecast on channel 22. The next blood drive is scheduled for Monday August 21, 2006, from 2 to 7 p.m. at the Community Center.

NEW FOREST FIRE RULES: Members attended a training update in May for the new revised forestry rules. It includes some changes to the outdoor burning regulations. If you have not yet received a new brochure, pick one up the next time you visit the station. Outdoor burning permits are issued on a day-to-day basis, weather conditions permitting. In general, permits are issued Monday through Saturday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., and Sunday and holidays from 4 to 5 p.m. at the station. With dry conditions, please be extremely careful with all smoking materials and be sure to extinguish any outside fire before leaving it. A buried fire is NOT considered to be extinguished.

Only a landowner can obtain a permit to burn; or a tenant or lessee can do so with written permission from the landowner. Written permission will be recognized for the calendar year and is kept at the fire station with the permit book. If you are not a property owner, call the station and obtain the exact information about what you need in a permission letter.

PHONE SERVICE: If you have an internet phone service provider, be sure to verify with your provider that you have Enhanced-911 access. Verifying this in advance with the provider will ensure that there are no problems if you should ever have to dial 911 from your home.

Conservation Commission News

Thank you, April Bacon! On Tuesday, May 30, the Bacon Conservation Easement, at the recommendation by the NCC, was approved by BOS. Over 50 acres of wooded uplands, vernal pools, an extensive stratified drift aquifer deposit (water recharge area) and several hundred feet of road frontage that contributes to the Town's rural character will now be protected forever. The property is adjacent to a large undeveloped private parcel that fronts Pawtuckaway Lake which, in turn, extends the "ribbon of green" provided by the State Park and other protected parcels. Bear-Paw Greenways will be the Primary Easement Holder and the NCC will hold the Executory Interest for the Conservation deed.

Volunteers from Nottingham will again be sampling river water from the North and Little Lamprey rivers this year as part of the Lamprey River Watershed Association's (LRWA) water quality monitoring program. Samples will be used to measure baseline parameters for water temperature, dissolved oxygen, PH, specific conductance (dissolved minerals) and turbidity (clarity). Other volunteers will also collect water samples for bacteria, nutrients (fertilizers/manures, etc.) and metals.

The NCC has been fielding requests for site inspections for possible wetland violations and monitoring housing and business development projects including the work at the USA Springs property. Before any project is begun that will impact a wet area, even a driveway culvert, the property owner must, by law, apply for a permit from the Town Office. The NCC will review the permit and visit the site, prior to recommendations and/or approval. Any one with a concern about a wetland is urged to contact the NCC.

There is an opening for a new member on the NCC. Current commission members include residents from most sections of town except for the Pawtuckaway Lake area. The NCC meets every second Monday of the month at 7 p.m. at the town offices, and the Natural Resource Subcommittee meets every third Tuesday at 6:30 p.m., if there is business to conduct. Meetings are open to the public.
