Stepping Out and Stepping Up

Springtime Conservation and Hiking Activities from the Nottingham Conservation Commission

Enjoy the change of seasons from winter to spring with outdoor activities from the Nottingham Conservation Commission and the Nottingham Trails Committee:

- Vernal Equinox hike on Sunday, March 19
- Big Night(s) for amphibian migrations from mid-March through early May
- . Town wide clean-up day on Saturday, April 15
- Earth Day trail clearing on Saturday, April 22
- Turtles of New Hampshire presentation on Saturday, April 29.

The **Vernal Equinox** occurs each year as the sun crosses the celestial equator going north. For 2023, the vernal equinox is on Monday, March 20, 5:24 PM, Eastern Time, in the Northern Hemisphere. You are invited to an equinox walk-and-talk on Sunday, March 19 at 1:30 PM at the Marston Farm Recreation Area (Mill Pond Road). We'll discuss how nature changes from winter to spring and identify the local flora and fauna. Steady rain/snow or icy trail conditions will cancel the event.

Big Night is the name for the annual amphibian migrations in the Northeast. On rainy evenings when the temperatures increase above freezing, ideally 40

degrees F or a b o v e , salamanders and frogs return to vernal pools and wetlands to breed. The migration evenings are



called the "Big Night" in reference to the large number of frogs and salamanders that gather along shared migration paths. These events occur throughout the Spring, typically from mid-March through early May. Look out for Amphibian Crossing signs on Nottingham's roads which alert there's a high potential for a migration event that evening, and limit driving during those evenings to be a hero for amphibians. The annual town wide clean-up day is on Saturday, April 15. Come to the Marston Farm Recreation Area (Mill Pond Road) at 9:00 AM and/or 11:00 AM at the Terninko Conservation Area (Case Road) to help with trail maintenance.

Earth Day, first established in 1970 on April 22, is an opportunity for community-supported conservation. Join us on Saturday, April 22 for easy hiking and trail clearing at 10:00 AM at the Marsh Woods Conservation Area (Freeman Hall Road) and 12 noon at Kennard Forest (Kennard Road). Bring a lopper and/or pruning saw for branch clearing and trail maintenance.

Join us at 10:00 AM on Saturday, April 29 at the Blaisdell Memorial Library for a presentation and discussion:

Turtles of New Hampshire. Come learn about New Hampshire's native turtle species, their natural history, behavior, and ways we can help them as they



enter their nesting season. We hope to see you there.

The Amphibians' Big Night!

A very magical time of year is almost upon us! Soon, our native frogs and salamanders will emerge in large numbers and make their annual migrations to find a mate. After a long winter hunkered down in their insulated shelters (called hibernaculums), there is a sudden burst of activity during the first warm, rainy evenings in the spring. These special nights are known as the "Big Night" and represent an important part of these amphibians' reproductive cycle.

Where they've spent the winter is dependent on the species. The larval stages of frogs and salamanders overwinter in water bodies, but the adults may overwinter underground or underwater. Some species are freeze-avoidant and hibernate (or "brumate", an ectotherm's version of hibernation) along the insulated bottoms of local water bodies, far underneath the ice. Green frogs, pickerel frogs, and leopard frogs are amongst the species which most commonly brumate in aquatic environments. The more land-dwelling toads however will burrow underground, also avoiding freezing temperatures at all costs.

Other species are freeze-tolerant and have specific



adaptations that allow them to spend winters on land. Spring peepers, gray tree frogs, and wood frogs are in this category, and during brumation the breaks

down a form of stored energy called glycogen from their liver to make glucose, a simple sugar which protects them by drawing water outside of their cells and drastically lowering the temperature at which freezing would occur. Major organs and cells are protected while the majority of the body freezes, the heart stops beating,



and the brain ceases to function - they are void of any activity until the temperatures increase again. Their incredible adaptations don't stop there, either. In order to prevent fatal tissue damage, they are able to thaw from the inside outwards: the vital organs begin to function first, and then the other tissues gradually unfreeze. This amazing process to survive freezing temperatures has only been documented in nine species of frogs in the entire world, and three of them are right here in New Hampshire!

All of New Hampshire's salamanders are freezeavoidant as well. The mole salamander group, which includes spotted, Jefferson, blue-spotted, and marbled salamanders, spend the winter deep underground

beneath the frost line, often utilizing abandoned animal burrows Woodland salamanders like redback salamander spend winter underneath logs and leaf litter



as well as in animal burrows, and when the temperature drops below freezing they are quick to join the mole salamanders underground below the frost line. Eastern newts, which are terrestrial in their juvenile stages as red efts and transition back to aquatic environments as adults, will overwinter in ponds when fully-grown, but will sometimes take refuge underground, as they do when they are juveniles.

After a long winter, the snow melts and fills up the vernal pools where amphibians will soon return. A characteristic of vernal pools is that they dry up during certain points in the season, so it's an urgent rush for amphibians to lay their eggs in these pools to allow their young enough time to mature. In spring the vernal pools are at their fullest, and on special evenings through the season, when temperatures rise above freezing and the ground is wet with rain, amphibians get the call to move to these pools to produce the next generation. Vernal pools play a critical role in the life cycle of amphibians, reptiles, and many other animals.

While amphibian species have developed some incredible adaptations which enable them to survive in northern climates, they are no match for the roads full of motorized vehicles that we have today. Studies have shown that even light traffic can decimate populations of frogs and salamanders on their migration nights. Road salt also has a huge negative impact on frogs and salamanders of all life stages due to their sensitive skin - sometimes on these evenings you may catch a glimpse of a frog that looks very bloated, which is very likely the result of exposure to road salt.

The Nottingham Conservation Commission sets up Amphibian Crossing signs on days where there is likely to be a Big Night occurring. If you see one of these signs, try to avoid driving that evening, and it will make a huge difference to our local amphibian populations. If you must drive, drive slowly, but know it can be nearly impossible to see them on the roads; small salamanders like the Jefferson salamander blend in exceptionally well with the pavement, and are already vulnerable to extinction. Losing any of these precious amphibians can be devastating to our local ecosystem, and while they have managed to adapt to live in New Hampshire's harsh winter climate, they simply can't keep up with human development, and so it is our responsibility to help them survive this man-made gauntlet.







Tim Dabrieo, Candidate for **Board of Selectmen**

My name is Tim Dabrieo, and I am running for the 3year Board of Selectmen position. I have lived in Nottingham for 20 years with my wife and we are raising our three sons here. We enjoy this great community and giving back to it whenever we can. I served on the Budget Committee for three years and have been a volunteer on the board of the Nottingham Youth Association for the past five years.

When I joined the town Budget Committee, I took the time and effort to learn more about both the town and school budget process. I attended a full day NHMA (New Hampshire Municipal Association) Budget and Finance workshop twice, with other Budget Committee and School Board members from Nottingham to learn more about the budget process and my role and responsibilities as a committee member. Training, time on the board, and experience in the position allowed me to then serve in the role as board chair in my final year. I plan to put the same amount of effort into this new role as well. I feel it is important to work together, respectfully, as a community to manage and prioritize costs that impact income taxes while keeping our town vibrant and providing our younger generation with the resources they need to be successful in the future.

Roger Richard, Candidate for **Board of Selectmen**

My name is Roger Richard, and I am a candidate for Selectperson. I am a lifelong New Hampshire resident who cares deeply about maintaining the close-knit small-town nature of Nottingham. I am concerned that the town is changing in a way that will make it unattractive and unaffordable for many existing residents and young people who might want to join the community. Alan Bershtein, Candidate for Budget Committee, 3-year term
