Facilities Assessment Committee

The committee, formed in July 2022, was charged to prepare for the Select Board an assessment of all town owned facilities and recommend an overall plan and priorities for maintenance and improvements. The Committee has reported back to the Select Board periodically to review progress.

Since formation, the committee has been active touring, inspecting, and meeting with Department Heads regarding the status of many town buildings.

While many issues which could be considered for capital improvements were uncovered, the one common theme in every department is that there is a very strong and immediate need for a town wide maintenance resource, such as a full time, part-time or contract position. There is considerable deferred maintenance due to the lack of an in-house maintenance resource. Department heads continue to struggle to address minor or moderately sized tasks which, over time, accumulate and become sometimes costly, sometimes dysfunctional, and sometimes unsafe. Continued deferment of said position has the potential to incur costly capital expenditures into the future.

All departments and town facilities should have a regular maintenance program which can be reviewed and addressed regularly. This program should include documentation of maintenance performed to provide a history of each building. Future work and maintenance can be addressed through this program and would provide a more reliable method of prioritizing the physical and economic needs of all facilities.

Volunteerism, while highly appreciated, is not a reliable source of maintenance, and should only be considered as an augmentation of a full-time planned program.

Well maintained town buildings/facilities can be the most influential element in projecting civic pride, improving employee and community relations, and saving tax payers money by avoiding costly repairs due to the absence of a preventative maintenance plan.

We are a multi-faith community that began here in 1875. All faith backgrounds are kindly





The March town elections are now in the rear-view mirror. After contending with a two-week delay in


v o t i n g because of w e a t h e r, v o t e r turnout was considerably low. Less than half of







Nottingham Historical Society

An Interesting Book From our Collection


The Historical Society has a number of old books, photos, and much more from a variety of sources which gives us a better understanding of the past 300 years of our history.

One book tells us about the various laws that defined proper conduct for citizens of the town in the late 1800s. This is the New Hampshire Town Officer reference volume containing the "General Laws of 1878" and "acts since passed".

These laws relate to towns and cities of New Hampshire, with "Decisions, Directions, and Forms" included. It was published in 1886. We thought there may be an interest in some of the details provided and how things have changed and yet how many of them are not much different from what is expected today. Below are some excerpts from the book that you may enjoy reading about...

Bribes or Threats: *If any person shall directly or indirectly*

hire, procure, induce, or in any way influence, or attempt to hire, procure, induce, or in any way influence, by payment, promises, offers of emolument, offers of reward of any kind, loans of money or other thing, threats or intimidations, any voter (1) to stay away from any townmeeting, or to avoid voting at any town-meeting, or to vote at any town meeting for or against any particular ticket or candidate for office, or to ask, in order to

disqualify himself from voting at any election, the abatement of his taxes, or to be excused from paying taxes, such person shall be fined not more than five hundred dollars, or be *imprisoned* not more than three months.

Order of Debate: No person shall speak in any meeting without leave of the moderator, nor when any person is orderly speaking; and all persons shall be silent at the desire of the moderator, on pain of forfeiting one dollar for each offense, for the use of the town.

If any person shall conduct in a disorderly manner, and, after notice from the moderator, persist therein, or shall in way disturb the meeting, or willfully violate any rule of proceeding, the moderator may command any constable (1) or any legal voter of the town to remove such disorderly person from the meeting, and detain him until the business is

Reserved Militia: The names of all male citizens of this state between the ages of eighteen and forty-five shall annually, in April, be enrolled alphabetically by the selectmen of the towns and places and assessors of the cities in which they respectively reside.

Said lists shall contain the number enrolled in their respective towns, places, and cities, and the number exempt on said rolls.

They shall file said lists in the offices of the respective town or city clerks on or before the first day of May in each year.

All able-bodied male citizens enrolled in this state, not exempt by law and not belonging to the New Hampshire National Guard, shall be known as the Reserved Militia of New Hampshire.
