## Property Taxes are due soon. Here are some helpful hints:

1. If you mail in your tax payment and would like to receive a receipt, you should mail back the entire bill along with a self-addressed stamped envelope. The top

portion of the bill will be stamped as paid and returned in the envelope provided.

- **2.** Common mistakes that result in a check being returned:
  - a. Date incorrect year
  - b. Legal line numeric mismatch make sure these numbers match, if they don't the check will be returned to sender.
  - c. Make sure you sign your check.
- **3.** Payments can be dropped off with the town clerk or main office staff outside of the tax collector's office hours. You can also hand your tax payment (in a stamped envelope) to Patty at the West Nottingham Post office. She will postmark the envelope and put it right in the Tax Collector mailbox while you watch. But only the tax collector can accept cash payments. Regular office hours are Tuesdays 9-12 and Wednesdays 4-6. Check your tax bill for extended hours during tax time.
- **4.** Payments can also be made online. Go to the Town Website at <a href="www.nottingham-nh.gov">www.nottingham-nh.gov</a> and select the Tax Kiosk button. Note the additional fees charged (2.95% for credit card payments and \$0.95 for ACH check). The option to choose payment type is at the very end of the process. Be very careful when typing in ACH check routing and account information. If your bank rejects the transaction, it will be treated as a bounced check with fees assessed.
- **5.** Consider requesting paperless billing to help reduce costs. This can be done when making an online payment or by emailing the tax collector at <a href="mailto:taxcollect@nottingham-nh.gov">taxcollect@nottingham-nh.gov</a> to request paperless billing. Please provide the email address you would like to receive your tax bill.
- **6.** If you haven't received your tax bill you can find it online if it has been created. Go to the Town website

## November / December 2023

www.nottingham-nh.gov and select the Tax Kiosk button. Taxes are due around July 1st and December 1st. The exact due date depends on holidays, office hours and when the warrant to create the bill was received. Thank you.

## YOUR VOICES WERE HEARD

Last year, it was announced that federal American Plan Rescue Act (ARPA) funding for the Campground Expansion Project was appropriated to the NH Division of Parks and Recreation. Its purpose was to replace obsolete infrastructure - adding new infrastructure and supporting facilities - to serve existing visitors and meet the growing demand for camping experiences statewide. In April of 2023, the Pawtuckaway Lake Improvement Association (PLIA) arranged for a public meeting at which representatives of NH State Parks explained their Pawtuckaway State Park expansion plans and heard first-hand from interested residents and park users. Stakeholders expressed concerns and serious opposition to the proposed expansion and stressed the need to improve and upgrade the Park, instead of expanding it. Below is a map of the State's proposed expansion:



This meeting was followed by a very robust letter writing campaign organized by the PLIA. Its goal was to let our state officials know that we had grave objections about their plans to expand the campgrounds to add 35 waterfront RV sites with water and electric hookups. In addition to opposing the new waterfront sites, the PLIA also raised issues about the inadequate condition of existing toilet and septic facilities at the Park. Specifically, we urged that they upgrade these systems, since their own initial assessment study mentioned two failed systems. We felt the bulk of their septic systems



could be close to 50 years old and at or near their end of life.

Moreover, problems of erosion at waterfront campsites have increased since the Park stopped enforcing its rule requiring campers to swim only at the Park beach.

We are pleased to announce that the NH Division of State Parks has listened to stakeholders and responded accordingly. On August 4 they released a statement that there will be NO NEW campsites constructed at Pawtuckaway State Park!

The Division of Parks and Recreation after careful consideration and thought has decided to redirect the federal American Rescue Plan funds appropriated to Pawtuckaway State Park. The project scope will include a new dump station to service recreational vehicles camping in the park and to renovate toilet buildings on Horse and Big Island. The renovations to the toilet buildings will include interior renovations, upgrade of utilities and shower addition where feasible. The Division will not be pursuing construction of additional campates.

Design and engineering for these projects continue and construction is expected to begin in the fall of

Later the Division elaborated on its plans, specifying that it now plans to demolish and reconstruct bath houses and septic facilities!

Here is that announcement on the Division's website:

"The Division of Parks and Recreation will use ARPA funds to reconstruct existing toilet buildings and create a dumping station. **The Division is proposing to do the following:** 

- Construct a new recreational vehicle dump station along the park road.
- Demolish and replace 5 toilet buildings in the Big Island and Horse Island camping areas.
- The project includes construction of new septic systems."

Finally, they are going to review their administrative procedures to examine the rules around swimming. They will also be taking an inventory of all the waterfront sites to prioritize work on the most eroded ones. There are steps that can be taken to decrease the amount of erosion that is occurring.

Thank you to all who answered the call and sent in emails and letters as part of our letter writing campaign! This is a major victory for all those who are concerned about the health and future of Pawtuckaway Lake, and You did it!

And *thank you* to the Division of State Parks for being responsive to citizen concerns.

## Pawtuckaway Lake Milfoil Update

Milfoil Areas 2023

Since milfoil was discovered in Pawtuckaway Lake in 2015, it has continued to spread to more lake areas. In 2022, the resources of the volunteer Pawtuckaway Lake Improvement Association (PLIA) Milfoil Team were severely stretched. Their ability to search the ever-increasing milfoil areas and remove the



milfoil that was located was overwhelmed. As a result, for the first time, the PLIA had to hire professional divers to remove milfoil. Suspecting that 2023 would present even more challenges, the PLIA applied for a NH DES Invasive Species grant in September 2022. This spring the Milfoil Team on Pawtuckaway Lake found that invasive milfoil had increased significantly in areas where it had been found in the past. Adding to that disappointment was the discovery of a major new area of dense milfoil in the Town Beach Cove area. This was the first time that milfoil was found at the northern end of the lake in the Fundy area. In addition to its impact on the lake, this area is adjacent to Drowns Dam, one of the two lake outlets. That posed a threat of milfoil fragments and milfoil infestation being introduced into the Lamprey River system. The increase in milfoil may have been partially due to the mild winter and lack of ice and snow cover on the lake, allowing milfoil to grow over the winter, but its presence created a crisis of even greater proportions.

Fortunately, the NH DES grant request was approved and approximately \$50,000 was allocated for milfoil mitigation in Pawtuckaway Lake for 2023. The grant money was used to hire a professional dive team from New England Milfoil for three days to remove milfoil in several areas of medium density infestation. That was followed in early July by a treatment of *ProcellaCOR* - a selective plant growth hormone - in three areas of high density milfoil. *ProcellaCOR* has been proven highly effective against variable milfoil with minimal effect on other vegetation or aquatic life.

Since then, the volunteer Milfoil Team has continued to dive and survey various areas of the lake and has not discovered any milfoil as of early September. While it is extremely unlikely that milfoil has been totally eradicated from the lake, it appears that milfoil is currently under tentative control. Experience from other lakes in NH warns us that, without continual monitoring, milfoil can come back and become a

significant issue again. As a result, the Milfoil Team will keep searching, using various techniques, to detect and remove milfoil before it becomes a major risk for the lake once again. It is fortunate that the Town has had the foresight to create a Fund for Invasive Species mitigation to address potential future needs since the State will only provide partial funding, at most, for any additional milfoil work.

We are grateful to the PLIA membership for its financial support, our volunteers for their tireless dedication, and NH DES for its leadership and grant funding.



## The Big Bad Five - Invasive Plant Species 101\*

Throughout the US and Canada, non-native invasive species have resulted in negative impacts to our natural environments. These



plants are able to outcompete native species and often do not provide the nourishment for wildlife that the suppressed plants provide. As our human population increases, in rural areas new subdivisions with additional roads and driveways usually result in the loss

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of woods and fields. Human actions too, whether intentional or not, also contribute to the spread of invasives.

Beyond reducing the biodiversity of wildlife found in a habitat, invasive plants can impact landscapes, recreation and even economy. Their rapid growth and thus dense roots can clog waterways, increase sedimentation, degrade pastures and crops, and enhance mosquito breeding.

There are currently 21 terrestrial plant species and fourteen (14) aquatic plant species listed by the NH Department of Agriculture. This article will cover five of the 35 listed.

**Oriental Bittersweet**: Flourishes in disturbed areas, roads, rivers, and field edges. Seeds are spread by birds and humans. Very aggressive, climbs up trees and girdles and smothers them. Is difficult to control. Pull out young plants, cut the vines and unwind if possible.

Burning Bush: Prefers uplands. Flourishes in full sun and in the understory of woods. Seeds are spread by birds and wildlife and often will result in the only plant species of the understory. Berries provide much less nourishment than native shrubs such as nannyberry, high bush cranberry and serviceberry. Dig up plants and if it's an ornamental on your property consider replacing with blueberry bushes that also turn crimson in autumn.

Japanese Knotweed: Commonly found along roadways, highways, ditches, open spaces. Spreads mostly by vegetative propagation: that is, when mowed, each intact node on the stalk is able to send out roots and grow into a new plant. That's how a single plant is able to spread down the edges of a roadway over time. (Do not cut and leave the stalks). When the plants are small, pulling and bagging individual plants is effective.

Variable milfoil: An aquatic invasive of lakes and ponds. Milfoil spreads by vegetative propagation when plant segments are broken off and distributed, often by motorized boats. Milfoil suppresses native species and destroys fish habitat. To control, hand pulling, bottom screening.

**Purple Loosestrife**: Attractive ornamental plant with a spike of purple flowers, blooms from June to August. Found in wetlands, aquatic systems, and roadside ditches. Spreads primarily by seeds that are distributed by wildlife, flowing water and by attaching to tires. Forms dense colonies that overwhelm a wetland. Hand pull or use a spade to dig up bigger plants. Biological controls (special species of beetles and weevils) have been used by the state of NH to successfully recover wetlands.

Please note that these five species can also be controlled by the use of special herbicides. It is recommended that you consult with an individual who is licensed in the use of herbicides.


