

At the Nottingham Historical Society's Van Dame

Schoolhouse Museum there is a cookbook "prepared and issued by the Ladies of the Universalist Church, Nottingham, NH" dated June 1896.

The first pages have a picture of the church along with a brief history. The recipes that follow are mixed in with advertisements from local businesses of the time.



Some of the recipes for

various types of cake with their submitter are shown below. We have reproduced some of the ads from the local businesses in the book on page 9 of this issue too!

Chocolate Cake

2 cups sugar, one cup butter, one cup sweet milk, three and one half cups flour, five eggs, one teaspoonful cream tartar, one half teaspoonful soda. Leave out the whites of two eggs for frosting. Make this of the whites, with one half cup frosting sugar, and six large tablespoonfuls grated chocolate. Spread it on while the cake is hot. Flavor all to suit taste.

Plum Cake

1 lb. 2 oz. flour, 1 lb. 2 oz. sugar, 1 lb. 2 oz. butter, 9 eggs, 2 lbs. of currants, 1-2 lb. citron, I-2 lb. raisins, 3 glasses wine, cloves, nutmeg, cinnamon, mace.

Fig Cake

1 cup sugar, 1 egg and yellows of three, 2-3 cup of sweet milk, three large spoonfulls of butter, 2 teaspoonfuls cream tartar, 1 of soda, 2 cups flour. Filling, 1-4 Ib. figs chopped fine, boil 2-3 cup sugar 1-3 cup water ten

minutes. When cold add the whites of three eggs, and the figs.

Dough Cake

3 cups raised dough, 2 cups sugar, 1 cup butter, 4 eggs, 1 teaspoonful soda, fruit, spice and wine to taste.

Marble Cake

The whites of 3 eggs, 1-2 cup sweet milk, 1 teaspoonful cream tartar, 1-2 soda, 1 3-4 cup flour, flavor with vanilla. Dark part, 1-2 cup sugar, 1-2 cup molasses, 1-2 cup butter, 1-2 cup milk, yolk 3 eggs, 1 teaspoon soda, 1-2 teaspoon all kind of spice, 2 cups flour.

Ribbon Cake

4 eggs, 1-2 cups of sugar, 1 cup butter,1 cup sweet milk, 4 cups of flour, 2 teaspoonfuls cream of tartar, 1 teaspoonful soda. After the above is well mixed take one third for the dark part and add 1 cup raisins, 2 cups currants, 1 cup citron, 1 teaspoonful cinnamon, and one of cloves, 2 tablespoonfuls of molasses.

In this issue, our community spotlight shines on...

Dallas Huggins and Drew Stevens!



Dallas Huggins and Drew Stevens are Nottingham residents who have established a service to the entire state of New Hampshire to rescue and rehabilitate injured turtles. They are thrilled to be in the Nottingham area because of the variety of turtles. We have seven varieties in New Hampshire, four of which are on the watch list, threatened list, or endangered list.

Dallas and Drew are licensed Turtle Rehabilitators through the New Hampshire Fish and Game Department. Currently, they are working on a transport program to get the turtles that need care to them from further areas of the state. Each turtle they care for is given a safe, quiet environment in their clinic complete with monitored lights, temperature, water and native plant life. They use an alphabetical series to name each one. This year they rescued over 130 turtles! The turtles are returned to the wild once they are healthy enough.

Both Dallas and Drew are very knowledgeable and are always willing to answer questions. They also provide informational talks at schools, public libraries, and interested organizations or clubs. As their endeavor has grown, they have established a non-profit organization and are very appreciative of any donations. Old towels and plastic totes are always needed. Monetary donations can be made on their website: nhturtlerescue. org or mailed to PO Box 185, Nottingham, NH 03290.

Seeing the Forest, the Trees, and Those Inbetween

Autumn Nature Hikes from the Nottingham Conservation Commission

The seasonal change from summer to fall provides new opportunities to view and appreciate our town's forests and conservation lands. The "Seeing the Forest, the Trees, and Those In-between" walk-and-talk discussions combine woodland hiking with local flora identification that can be observed along the trail. Join us to share your knowledge and learn about our area's natural diversity.

Two hikes are planned to enjoy the change of seasons led by members of the Nottingham Conservation Commission and the Nottingham Trails Committee:

- Autumn Equinox hike: Sunday, September 24, 11:30 AM, Terninko Conservation Area
- Forest walk-and-talk: Sunday, October 8,11:00 AM, Marsh Woods Conservation Area.

The Autumn Equinox occurs each year as the sun

crosses the celestial equator going south. For 2023, the Autumn Equinox is on Saturday, September 23, AM. 2:40Eastern Time, in Northern Hemisphere.



You are invited to an equinox walk-and-talk on Sunday, September 24, at 11:30 AM at the Terninko Conservation Area (Case Road). We will discuss how nature changes from summer to fall and identify the local flora and fauna. Steady rain or poor weather conditions will cancel the event.

Scout Dive Team Mission to Help with Pawtuckaway Lake's Milfoil Problem!

Jamie Burleigh, Weed Control Diver for the PLIA Milfoil Team, is pleased to announce that the Scouts of BSA Troop 167 are on a mission to help with Pawtuckaway



Lake's milfoil problem. With the help of Scout Master Dan DeButts and Jamie, a dive club has been formed within the troop.

To encourage more people to become stewards of the lake for milfoil control, Jamie has worked with Dan DeButts to develop a program that would enable Scouts to be trained in SCUBA diving. This will be considered community service for their requirements for

advancement and a Merit badge because the Scouts who are getting SCUBA qualified will be part of the troop's dive club.

The plan is for Jamie to train these Scouts to search for milfoil on Pawtuckaway Lake, as organized by Dan DeButts and coordinated with the PLIA. Those Scouts who do not wish to be certified can be trained as surface support for search divers in the troop, so any Scout who wants to be involved will be able to join the club. Adults who want to dive with the Scouts will have to take Youth Protection Training and be active with the troop in some official capacity.


Jamie reports that the Scouts have now all completed the class and pool requirements. Unfortunately the weather in July has not allowed for their two open water dives to complete the training. Their plan is to get it completed the first week of August if the weather cooperates.

The aim is to instill in these Scouts a desire to help after Scouting and, Jamie hopes, be future stewards of the lake. The more mature Scouts, after at least a season of searching, can become Weed Control Divers. He will train them how to identify milfoil and how to work near it so they don't accidentally spread it.

The PLIA applauds Jamie's initiative and wants to assist any interested Scout in taking the SCUBA certification course, which is costly. For that reason, the PLIA Board has voted to donate \$2,000, to be managed by the Scout troop and specifically assigned to pay for certification. With any luck these Scouts will become the next generation of lake stewards.




